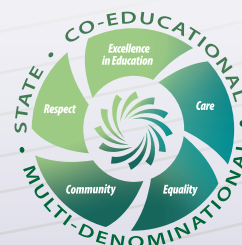

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## HISTORY

McEgan College is a co-educational school providing a broad curriculum to both girls and boys up to Leaving Certificate level. The school prides itself on catering for the needs of all students and indeed for the wider community.

The original school was opened in 1934 and was dedicated to Boetius McEgan, Bishop of Ross, who was captured by Cromwellian forces after a battle in the Castle Park and executed at Carrigadrohid Castle in 1650. In 1984 an extension of ten rooms was built on the site of the original castle and in 1996 three additional classrooms were added to the College. Since then, the school has been renovated with various upgrades to classrooms, equipment and resources to meet the needs of our dynamic and highly motivated student cohort. In 2012 we opened an ASD specialised room and in 2016 a MGLD room was added.

A new state of the art purpose built "Moderate General Learning Disability" unit was officially opened by Minister for Agriculture, Food and the Marine Mr. Michael Creed T.D. in November 2018. This specialised educational unit can cater for eight students with a diagnosis of MGLD.

## SCHOOL CURRICULUM

The school offers a Junior Cycle programme, a Leaving Certificate programme, a Transition Year programme and a Leaving Certificate Applied programme. Higher, Ordinary, Foundation and Common Level is offered in subjects where applicable.

In 2023, an investment of over €500,000 was made in state-of-the-art Materials Wood and Engineering rooms. These rooms installed with modern, cutting edge resources and materials will transform the learning experience for our existing and future students.



## JUNIOR CYCLE SUBJECTS

This course is of three years in duration. First year students will engage in 'taster' modules for nine weeks, where students will try all subjects, the curriculum has to offer. After the nine weeks, students will get the opportunity to choose their subjects for their Junior Cycle. Taking this approach, along with developing students' digital skills, this will best prepare them for senior cycle and beyond.

## CODE OF BEHAVIOUR

## LUNCHTIME

Students in first, second and third year are not permitted to leave the School Campus during lunchtime. At McEgan College we encourage healthy eating. Under the Free School Meals initiative, students can avail of freshly prepared hot and cold food options. This service is managed by The School Food Company.

## PARENTS COUNCIL

The school has a very active and committed Parents Council.

The Parents Council does a lot of valuable work for the school, its students and teachers and has two representatives on the Board of Management. We are deeply indebted to our Parents Council.

## STUDENT COUNCIL

A student council is elected each year to represent the views of the student body.

Two students are elected from each year group. They meet regularly and serve as a liaison between the students and the staff. They hold regular meetings with School Management. The student council also organises events such as teacher/student soccer matches, non uniform days and other charity events.

All monies raised by the student council are used by them to improve facilities for students.

## COMPUTER STUDIES

McEgan College computer network has recently upgraded to High Speed Broadband ensuring regular and fast broadband access throughout the school building. We offer a wide range of classes where practical computer skills are taught. This upgrade in Wi-Fi speed will fully support the use of one to one digital devices for students ensuring an excellent educational experience for all students.

Over the last number of years, McEgan College have been constantly developing our digital strategy to harness the many benefits that are available to enhance teaching and learning through the use of digital technologies.

Like many schools, the pandemic inspired the school to further embrace a digital learning approach through remote and blended learning strategies. This has led to the use of technology becoming a core part of the everyday experience of the students in the school. The Microsoft 365 suite of software, with Microsoft Teams and OneNote at its centre, has become a crucial tool to assist teaching and learning for students in the school.

With the use of technology now at the heart of the educational experience in McEgan College, the next logical step was for students to have their own digital learning devices.

The many benefits of students having their own educational specific learning devices are clear: everything from the advantages of using e-books; to giving them more autonomy over their own learning; to building their digital skills to prepare them for the digital workplace and society of the future.



## CAREER GUIDANCE / COUNSELLING

This is a central part of the schools service to all our students. Young people have to make important decisions about subject choice, career paths etc. at a very early stage in their school lives. We have a fully qualified Guidance Counsellor available to students. Here, in a friendly and relaxed atmosphere and in complete confidence, students are advised and guided on future career plans and can discuss any matter causing concern.

In this context we are pleased to note that in recent years, our students have gone on to distinguish themselves in a variety of areas including University, Institutes of Technology, Teacher Training, Banking, Catering, Secretarial, Apprenticeships, as well as in the area of further training.

McEgan College is a part of the UCC+ programme and the CIT Access which provide students with additional supports and resources for entry into these institutions.

Senior students also have one to one mentoring available from a team of teachers on the Teaching & Learning initiative where expert guidance and encouragement is provided.

As part of the DEIS government programme, McEgan College also has access to a School Completion Project Worker and Home School Community Liaison teacher who provide support to both students and parents.
